

## Webpage Citation Examples for APA 7th Ed.

All entries on a References page should be double-spaced. To save room, our examples have not been double-spaced.

### Webpage, news website, article\*

Author's Last Name, First Initial. Middle Initial. (Date of publication or update). *Title of article*. Site Name. URL

(Enter the specific date from the source: the year, the month and year, or a full date. Always use the most recent date, whether that is the publication date or the "last updated" date. Do not use the "last reviewed" date because content that has been reviewed has not necessarily been changed. If the date cannot be determined, enter n.d. in the Year field.)

[\*There is a difference between an online newspaper (ex: *The Oregonian*, *USA Today*, *The Washington Post*) and an online news source (ex: BBC News, CNN, Huffpost, MSNBC). Use the Periodical Article template when the article is from a print or online newspaper. If the article is from an online news source, use the Webpage template instead.]

### Webpage, one author

Warren, R. (2018, April 16). *Jane Austen biography*. Jane Austen.  
<https://www.janeausten.org/jane-austen-biography.asp>

Creator/Author's Last Name, First Initial. Middle Initial. (Date of publication or update). *Title of webpage*. Site Name. URL

(You do not need to split a long URL between two lines. It is acceptable to put the full URL on the next line. Do not put a period at the end of the URL.)

### Webpage, organization as author and publisher

National Park Service. (2020, June 8). *Crater Lake National Park*. <http://www.nps.gov/crla/>

Organization's Name. (Date of publication or update). *Title of webpage*. URL

(When the author and the site name are the same, do not include the site name.)

## Webpage, TV series review, online

Adams, E. (2020, July 27). *Disney actually made a good Muppet show—yaaaaaaaay!* [Review of the TV series *Muppets now*, by Andrew Williams, Bill Barretta, & Sabrina Wind, Executive Producers]. A.V. Club. <https://tv.avclub.com/disney-actually-made-a-good-muppet-show-yaaaaaaaay-1844518707>

Author's Last Name, First Initial. Middle Initial. (Date of publication or update). *Title of webpage article*. [Review of the TV series *Series title*, by Executive Producer1's First Initial. Middle Initial. Executive Producer1's Last Name, Executive Producer2's First Initial. Middle Initial. Executive Producer2's Last Name, & Executive Producer3's First Initial. Middle Initial. Executive Producer3's Last Name, Executive Producers]. Site Name. URL

(To cite a TV series review published on a website, use Citation Maker to create a citation for the website. After you save the citation to your reference list, add the information about the TV series review in brackets. Follow the same format for a review of a book, film, television episode, music album, etc.)

### Examples:

[Review of the book *Book title*, by A. A. Author].

[Review of the book *Book title*, by E. E. Editor, Ed.].

[Review of the film *Film title*, by D. D. Director, Dir.]

[Review of the TV series episode "Episode title," by W. W. Writer, Writer, & D. D. Director, Dir.]

[Review of the album *Album title*, by S. S. Singer]

## Webpage, dynamic (designed to change frequently), not archived, with retrieval date

U.S. Census Bureau. (n.d.). *U.S. and world population clock*. U.S. Department of Commerce. Retrieved January 9, 2020, from <https://www.census.gov/popclock/>

Agency or Organization's Name. (n.d.). *Title of webpage*. Site Name. Retrieved date, from URL

(Although most webpages can be updated, only a few are designed to change content frequently. Add a retrieval date when the content is designed to change frequently and is not archived. Note: To cite a specific graph from such a population counter page, use the Visual Works template instead.)

(Use the specific agency responsible for the webpage as the author. Government agencies are often part of larger groups called parent agencies. In that case, use the name of the parent agency as the site name, and if there is more than one, separate each agency name with a comma.)
